

Sometimes, pupils have trouble deciding whether to just add an 's' or to add an 'es' to make words plural.

Can you think of any rules to help you remember this?

With most nouns, you can just add an 's' to make them plural.

Example: one shoe becomes two shoes

Nouns ending in hissing, buzzing or shushing sounds (s/x/ch/sh) usually add <u>es</u> to form the plural.

Example: One fish becomes two fishes

Many words ending in 'y' such as 'donkey' or 'baby' are difficult to spell correctly when forming the plural.

There is a clear rule to help you remember how to create plurals of words ending in 'y'.

Example:
If a word ends VOWEL + Y like 'boy' or 'monkey' you add an 's'.
One boy becomes two boys.
If a word ends CONSONANT + Y like 'baby' or 'city' you remove the 'y' and add 'ies'.
One baby becomes two bab <u>ies.</u>


Exercise 6 - Irregular Plurals

A number of nouns have unusual plurals. Some change the middle vowel (goose becomes geese), while others keep the plural form of the original language (a = singular, ae = plural in Latin). Some don't change at all! (One sheep becomes two sheep)

The present tense tells us what **is happening**, while the past tense tells us what **happened**.

Words ending in a single consonant, with a short vowel sound in front of them (i.e beg, drop) double the consonant when creating the past tense.

For example: I dropped my bag.

Words ending in a single consonant, with a long vowel sound in front of them (i.e beep, count) DO NOT double the consonant.

For example: My phone beeped.




